The 2022 Elections are important Elections, also called "MIDTERMS". For the FEDERAL part of them, we are electing one US SENATOR and 17 US REPRESENTATIVES, *midway* into the term of the current president, which may affect the balance of power in the US Congress.

But in these even-numbered-year elections, voters should know that *because so many CRUCIAL ISSUES are decided by State Government, STATE ELECTIONS have at least as much IMPACT on the Lives of Every Pennsylvanian, as Federal Elections.*

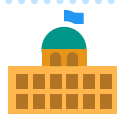
Every Election Counts! WILL YOU Be Represented in the 2022 Elections?

Only about 40% of voters show up for these Elections, calling it an "off-year" when a President is not on the ballot. YET, the outcomes, especially of STATE Elections, will affect EVERY AREA of Pennsylvanians' lives.

1 PA GOVERNOR,
1 PA LT. GOVERNOR,
25 STATE SENATORS (HALF of them) and 203 STATE REPRESENTATIVES (ALL of them).

The 20-35% of voters who vote in PA's CLOSED PRIMARIES CHOOSE the CANDIDATES who land on the November General Election ballot!
